I happened to stop by the LHS Guidance office today and asked a few questions about colleges.

The conversation was interesting and enlightening. I was told that the majority of families and senior students at LHS are very "big time"

sports oriented and many seniors are interested in applying to schools that offer "big time" sports for viewing, not being part of any team.

I then asked "What are the top ten schools that the LHS seniors apply to and what are the top ten schools that they actually attend?" Here

is the list of the top ten colleges/universities that seniors apply to for admission. In no particular order they are: All of the NY State

Universities (SUNY) schools including Binghamton, Oswego, Oneonta and Cortland. The out of state "big time" sports schools that they

also apply to after the "safe" SUNY schools are the University of Wisconsin, The Ohio State, Tampa University, the University of Alabama and Miami University. Once these applications are mailed the decision comes down to the cost at each school and academics. The colleges/universities that the majority of LHS seniors actually attend after all acceptances are received are, again in no particular order, the SUNY schools with the number one being Binghamton where last year 30 seniors applied, 29 were accepted, and 15 actually attended.

After Binghamton came Cortland, Oswego, the University of Delaware, Buffalo and colleges in the state of Florida especially Miami and

Tampa. There are a few, maybe 3-4, who attend an IVY League school or a Southern state school. Some Southern colleges that LHS seniors

have attended in the past few years are East Carolina and Elon. Only one in the past five years has gone to any mid western school and if they do that school is often the University of Arizona. We have one student from last year attending the University of Southern California.

If any of the LHS athletes compete at the college level the majority of them do so at Division 2 or Division 3 colleges with some sort of financial aid or grant package. Very few receive any large financial offers for athletic abilities. I learned a lot in that guidance visit and it seems the tuition cost is the final decision in making the college selection. The SUNY schools average around \$24,000 while the private colleges/universities can cost as high as \$60-70,000 Some students will live off campus when attending a Florida school living with their grand-parents who have a residence in that State. After one year of their living there they establish a residence and then can receive in

State tuition costs. It's a game many play but it's within the rules. It may be time for all of you to save some bucks for your grand children's college education!

Newsday published an article announcing the rise in tuition for local Community Colleges listing Nassau Community, Suffolk Community, Farmingdale State, Stony Brook and SUNY Old Westbury.

Nassau Community College, which has an enrollment of close to 10,000, will rise \$248 per school year to a total of \$5,350 annually. Suffolk

Community which has an enrollment of approximately 26,000 will rise \$350 to a total of \$5,220 annually. Both Nassau and Suffolk

Community colleges are two year schools. The cost for the four year SUNY Community Colleges, including SUNY Old Westbury,

Farmingdale State and Stony Brook, is now \$6,870 annually.

Those SUNY colleges such as Binghamton, Oswego, Oneonta and Cortland are NOT Community schools thus they have higher tuition costs.

In case anyone was wondering, the total enrollment at Lynbrook High School this school year is 895. I don't have the breakdown per class

but they are about the same average size.

The Village of Lynbrook has started a campaign where banners, approximately 6'x3', are being place on the Village telephone poles

honoring servicemen and women. There are about 20 currently hanging in the Village area. Many have been placed along Atlantic

Avenue while others are starting to get placed along Merrick Road within the Village boundaries.

If you wish to honor anyone you know you can do so by calling the Village of Lynbrook at 516-599-8784 and ask for an application.

The banner cost is \$175 and it is displayed for three years after which the Village claims they "wear out" from weather conditions.

The banner then gets returned to the person/family who sponsored that service person. You can also mail for an application by

writing to: Inc Village of Lynbrook, 1 Columbus Drive, PO Box 7023, Lynbrook, NY 11563. If you decide to honor someone you MUST

supply a clear B&W photo, with no others in the photo, of that service man/woman in their military uniform. All of the banners

currently displayed show a photo from the waist up or a profile photo of the honoree.

I am personally planning to honor my uncle, Bob Weber, who served in WW2 in Europe from 1940-1945 participating in many battles.

If you do so and your banner gets placed on a telephone pole I will be glad to take a photo of it and send it to you. Keep me posted.

So, you want to be a teacher? Well, those who like to look at numbers may enjoy this latest media list of the AVERAGE TEACHERS

SALARY in each of the 51 States. These numbers are from the school year of 2017-2018.

The National average teacher's salary is \$60,443.

The top FIVE States averages are: New York \$85, 585...California

\$81,126...Massachusetts \$79,710....District of Columbia \$76,486 ....Connecticut \$73,113. The lowest five States were: Arizona \$47,746...Utah \$47,604...Oklahoma \$45,678...West Virginia \$45,642 ...Mississippi \$43,107.

The local Lynbrook School District teacher's salaries (give or take a few thousand bucks) are as follows: #1 a high school teacher with over 20 years in service also coaching two varsity sports \$156,828...#2 a high school teacher with over 20 years in service also in charge of three club activities \$148,155...#3 an elementary school teacher with over 20 years in service who also coaches one varsity sport and runs after school activities \$130,653...#4 a high school teacher with over 20 years in service who is in charge of one after school club \$129,093....#5 a high school teacher who has been teaching for over 30 years and has no other after school District income \$130,022. The average salary for all Lynbrook teachers is \$71,744. The starting salary, give or take a few thousand bucks, is approximately \$50,000.

Many teachers also have summer school positions to add another \$5,000-\$8,000 to their salary and future pension tabulations.
